

Survey launched to get the views of primary educators

A new survey for primary educators has been launched to understand more about their views on Artificial Intelligence, the Labour Party's proposed education policies, and engaging families. Devised by Tapestry, an education led company, the survey also included input from educators, and education organisations, who suggested themes for investigation.

Artificial intelligence is already beginning to be added to the tool box of useful technology available to primary schools. Tapestry is interested to know how teachers, and others in primary schools, feel about AI and how it might, or might not, support their practice.

Dr Helen Edwards, co-founder of Tapestry and a former teacher, said: *"Stories about AI, and whether it's good or bad, seem to be everywhere at the moment. Amidst the noise, what's important is to understand if AI is something that's helping to make educators' lives easier, or not. This kind of insight can help inform attitudes and use of AI moving forward."*

In an election year, the survey also wants to hear about primary educators' views on the policies from the Labour Party, and what they feel is missing.

Finally, the survey asks how educators encourage parents and carers to share information about how their child is learning at home. *"Parents and carers are their child's first educators",* said Dr Helen Edwards. *"Finding out about life at home helps us deepen our knowledge of each child, so we can better support their learning and development."*
