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GROUND BREAKING APPROACH TO RECORDIING PROGRESS OF CHILDREN WITH SEND

<u>Tapestry</u>, the online learning journal used by thousands of nurseries and schools, has developed a new assessment tool to help teachers and nursery managers to assess the progress of children with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND). *Cherry Garden Branch Maps* is a ground-breaking tool which has been created in partnership with London-based Cherry Garden School, a special school which caters for children aged two to eleven years who have severe and complex learning needs.

Cherry Garden Branch Maps is the culmination of four years' work and provides a much more granular approach to capturing the development of children with SEND. This is because it allows small developments to be easily recorded and celebrated. Most importantly, it enables early years teachers to log lateral progress as well as linear progress. This is essential in SEND because progress can be as much about applying a learnt skill in a different context, as it can be about learning new skills.

Children's progress is captured online in the form of cherry trees or flowers and they have one for each main curriculum area. Children with the most profound needs have a flower with interactive petals which grow as a child gains understanding, and, importantly, deepen in colour to record a child's lateral progress. Those children with less severe needs have their progress represented through leaves which are added to the tree as they secure their understanding of different topics. When a parent or practitioner clicks on a leaf or petal they can access the observations made for that child.

Stephen Kilgour, who worked at Cherry Garden School for 11 years and was Deputy Head, developed Cherry Garden Branch Maps. He is now SEND advisor and Outreach Teacher at Tapestry, and said:

"It can be hard to record the small steps of progress made by a child with special educational needs. The outcome of this is that children with SEND can appear to be 'trapped' at one level for months on end, when they have actually achieved a great deal. Cherry Garden Branch Maps is designed to solve the problem because it captures progress regardless of the route a child's learning takes."

Dr Helen Edwards, co-founder of Tapestry said:

"It is essential that the progress of every child can be celebrated and shared with parents and carers. So, we were delighted to collaborate with Cherry Garden School when they approached us to help. The resulting Cherry Garden Branch Maps is already getting very positive feedback from staff, parents and carers, and we're looking forward to Tapestry customers using it to capture the achievements of children with additional needs."



Funding for children with Special Needs is linked to an Education Health Care plan which is often not finalised until a child is much older in primary school (Key Stage 1 or 2). This means early years practitioners and teachers often support children with special needs without receiving any additional funding. As well, recruiting SEND specialists can be a challenge so staff may be inexperienced. Cherry Garden provides a flexible, easy to use approach that can help to build confidence in staff members and ensure progress and growth is captured effectively. It was designed to provide practitioners with a more thorough understanding of the milestones you would expect to find in a very young, typically developing child.
